That doesn't address the delay in getting the information in the public. <u>1m4s</u>: There are a lot of people concerned. <u>1m6s</u>: You'll just direct all those questions to Dr. Clark. 1m8s: Okay. I'm speaking as a person. 1m42s: Okay. <u>1m43s</u>: When you talk about transparency, would board be transparent? 1m47s: How can we do that? 1m50s: Yes, sir. <u>1m52s</u>: Yeah, that would be great. <u>2m0s</u>: I have my notes at home. <u>2m3s</u>: We can go out for coffee sometimes. <u>2m6s</u>: I can certainly share some of the things I'm remembering. 2m10s: So, the first thing that I found in the FOIA request was the email to Kent Metzger <u>2m17s</u>: on March 23rd that had the contract proposal. 2m21s: And it was a \$19,000 contract proposal for BFW Engineering to come in <u>2m27s</u>: and inspect the Dennis Lab schools. <u>2m30s</u>: So, if there were some kind of policy that required the district to publish 2m35s: in a timely manner purchase orders, then the news media and the public 2m41s: would have been able to get access to that information without somebody like me <u>2m45s</u>: making a pointed FOIA request. 2m48s: Okay. <u>2m49s</u>: And you feel that that information is vital for the general public to know <u>2m53s</u>: that we hired an engineer for them? <u>2m56s</u>: The reason why that might be important to the public is because 3m2s: it involves structural issues with the building. <u>3m7s</u>: I think it would probably be hard to legislate everything you might need to know, <u>3m11s</u>: but if you can see purchase orders now, you know there's a contract with the engineer <u>3m15s</u>: and that could tip you off to the structural issues. <u>3m19s</u>: One of the problems with that, because you'd have to make a policy that says <u>3m24s</u>: purchase orders need to be public, is you tell competition what they lost to, <u>3m31s</u>: what things they lost to, which kind of puts the winners at a disadvantage. <u>3m37s</u>: In other words, everybody starts looking at what these things were. <u>3m43s</u>: I mean, typically a lot of this would be put out for bid,
